1991 was an outstanding year for interesting finds, particularly the reappearance of old records - in many cases with large numbers of plants at the site. The long cold, wet spring following the two hot summers gave good growing conditions for many plants, particularly some of our more 'southern' species.

The good records are also due to the diligence of our many sharp-eyed recorders; their work forms the solid centre of our Society, and we send thanks to all.

Details of the records, and the year's recording in general are reported at the two meetings.

Some members I hear are confused as to whether they should record in tetrads or in 10 kms. The answer is simple: please record in either, whichever is most convenient to you (but remembering to note the area recorded on the card - by crossing through either the appropriate tetrad, or the whole 10 km, on the top left of the card). All tetrad records can very easily be assimilated into 10 kms, when required as these. But tetrads are often a convenient-sized area in which to record - unless your travels take you around one or more 10 kms.

If each member records the area near home this would give us a good covering of the counties. Before the February meeting we hope to prepare a list of those 10 kms which have few post 1987 records; any member unable to come on February 29th who would like to know of underworked areas please contact the East and West Sussex Recorders.

The Atlas of Sussex Mosses, Liverworts and Lichens is now with the printers and we hope to have copies available for sale at the A.G.M. Apart from maps of bryophytes and lichens, the book includes a comprehensive account of the ecology of Sussex by Francis Rose, with many references to the vascular plants as well as bryophytes and lichens.

Hawkweeds. I am still prepared to act as Recorder for Hieracium in Sussex. I am always glad to receive specimens for identification, either neatly pressed or fresh. It is usually necessary to have the whole plant above the ground in order to determine the species; the plant should not be uprooted, however, but cut at ground level. If there are only a few specimens (say 3 or 4), none should be collected. The key to South East England hawkweeds is useful for at least getting near to the species; if any member has not got this and would like a copy, I can provide one. The three commonest species are *H. perpropinquum*, *H. trichocaulon* and *H. exotericum* agg (incl. *grandidens*): these probably account for over 80% of the hawkweeds in Sussex.
